The OECI Oncology Days are a focal point for the European cancer community, where leaders, scientists, clinicians, and other healthcare professionals gather to share the latest advances in cancer care and research. From cancer science to quality in comprehensive cancer care, patient empowerment and EC actions, we strive to put the spotlight on the hot topics, and highlight the excellence of our member institutions.

The OECI Oncology Days bring together representatives of our Members, who share with us the same challenge: placing patients at the centre of their cancer journey and working to provide them equal access to high quality cancer care and to the best available treatments. We try to achieve this together by strategic alliances in Europe and outside the continent. Several centres from Vietnam, Tanzania, Lebanon, Jordan, Turkey, Colombia and Chile, joined OECI, because they believe in the importance of exchanging with – and learning from – European models of excellence.

With 46 years of history since our foundation, we understood that the keys to achieving this vision are openness to experience, curiosity and dialogue. The OECI Oncology Days are a forum for dynamic exchange, creative thinking and cooperation - a space to focus on identifying key priorities and developing new solutions.

We are grateful to the Helsinki Comprehensive Cancer Centre who hosts the 46th Edition of our Members' Assembly of Directors.

This year's Edition will kickstart on June 12 with a session focusing on the OECI A&D Programme, which is currently comprising 60% of our 141 Members. A significant milestone has been achieved in 2023 as we have certified our first extra-European cancer centre in Chile – Fundación Arturo López Pérez (FALP). In addition, a new set of standards - the OECI European Quality Standards for Cancer Networks, have been piloted this year for the 2nd time in the Oncology Network South-East Netherlands (OncoZON), and a revision of all our standards is underway.

The path that led us to OECI46 is also the result of the contributions coming from our Working Groups and our members' active involvement in our agenda, paired with a precise and effective management. Namely, the activities developed within the Cancer Economics WG, the Biobanks and Pathobiology WG and the Outcomes Cancer Research WG. The activities carried out in these WGs fostered cancer-related EC projects.

The past years have brought to light a growing body of evidence on the benefits of shared decision-making with our patients. We have learnt that it is essential for health care professionals to move away from 'top-down' approaches and proactively co-design with patients the decisions related to their cancer journey. This is an important step forward, and the reason why OECI is relaunching its Patients' WG, that will be presenting in Helsinki its new Programme of Activities within the framework of the event.

Our mission to build a close-knit community aligns with Europe's Beating Cancer Plan and the actions launched by the EU Cancer Mission. The Programmes aim to ensure that by 2030, 90% of all patients should have access to National Comprehensive Cancer Centres linked through a EU Network.

Under the coordination of OECI, a large network of 27 Member States and 5 Associated Countries, a new Coordination and Support Action (CSA) – Comprehensive Cancer Networks

for Europe (CCI4EU), was launched on 1 May 2023. CCI4EU is a capacity building programme designed to rethink the cancer culture and reduce inequalities. The CSA involves 54 cancer centres, most of which are an OECI Member. Together with National Health Authorities, the cancer centres will contribute to creating or improving National Cancer Infrastructures. CCI4EU aims to drive change and improvement in research and care, and achieve greater integration between them with the support of an educational programme that should become a continuing educational initiative in each country.

As part of the OECI Scientific Conference 2024, a dynamic Session on the most relevant Joint Actions will take place. The Joint Actions leaders will be invited to present the state of play of their actions and find solutions to better integrate their efforts in order to benefit our patients, reduce political conflicts and avoid that national interests prevail over the objectives of our actions.

Helsinki 2024 is a turning point in the history of our Organisation, as we are building of the Europe of Research and Care. I am certain that our Members will be joining this important crucial event, where the future of OECI will be designed.

On behalf of all our Members and the European Cancer Community, I thank the Helsinki University Hospital Comprehensive Cancer Centre for the time and effort put towards hosting the 2024 Edition of the OECI Oncology Days.

Director's welcome

The year 2024 marks the 46th Anniversary of the founding of the Organisation of European Cancer Institutes (OECI). Finland has been designated for the first time as the host Country for the OECI Oncology Days, and Helsinki has been awarded the privilege of welcoming the prestigious Event.

The OECI Oncology Days 2024 will take place from June 12th to June 14th in collaboration with the Helsinki University Hospital Comprehensive Cancer Centre. The Centre became a member of OECI in 2009 and was designated as a Comprehensive Cancer Centre in 2014 as the first Nordic Country. The Centre re-accredited in 2021.

The OECI46 Oncology Days cover again highly important topics in Oncology.

Special techniques in modern radiotherapy will be introduced during the 2024 Scientific Conference. New cutting-edge technology where academic research has set the basis for innovation, such as the boron neutron capture therapy (BNCT) with neutron accelerator, will be introduced. BNCT combines the targeting potential of both drugs and particles. Keeping targeting as a key topic of evolving radiotherapy techniques, we will also hear interesting keynote presentations about current evidence and future of proton therapy, MRI guided radiotherapy, and radiopharmaceuticals in molecular radiotherapy.

How to fight inequalities in cancer research and care will be the fundamental topic for the other session of the Scientific Conference. The reduction of inequalities and capacity building are among the key priorities of OECI.

During and after the Events planned during the Oncology Days, there will be time for the participants to enjoy the surroundings. Helsinki is the beautiful capital of Finland and the rapidly growing city in Europe. Helsinki was chosen as the World Design Capital for the year 2012, and in 2014 it was awarded with the City of Design status as part of the Creative Cities Network established by UNESCO.

The Oncology Days will be held at the hotel Presidentti in the very central part of Helsinki city center. 12 June is the annual Helsinki Day with many big and small events in the city. The Gala dinner will take place in the Restaurant NJK located on the island in the immediate neighbourhood of Helsinki city center and the marketplace. Welcome Reception will be hosted by the Mayor at the City Hall.

On behalf of the Helsinki University Hospital Comprehensive Cancer Centre, it is my honour and great pleasure to welcome you in Helsinki.

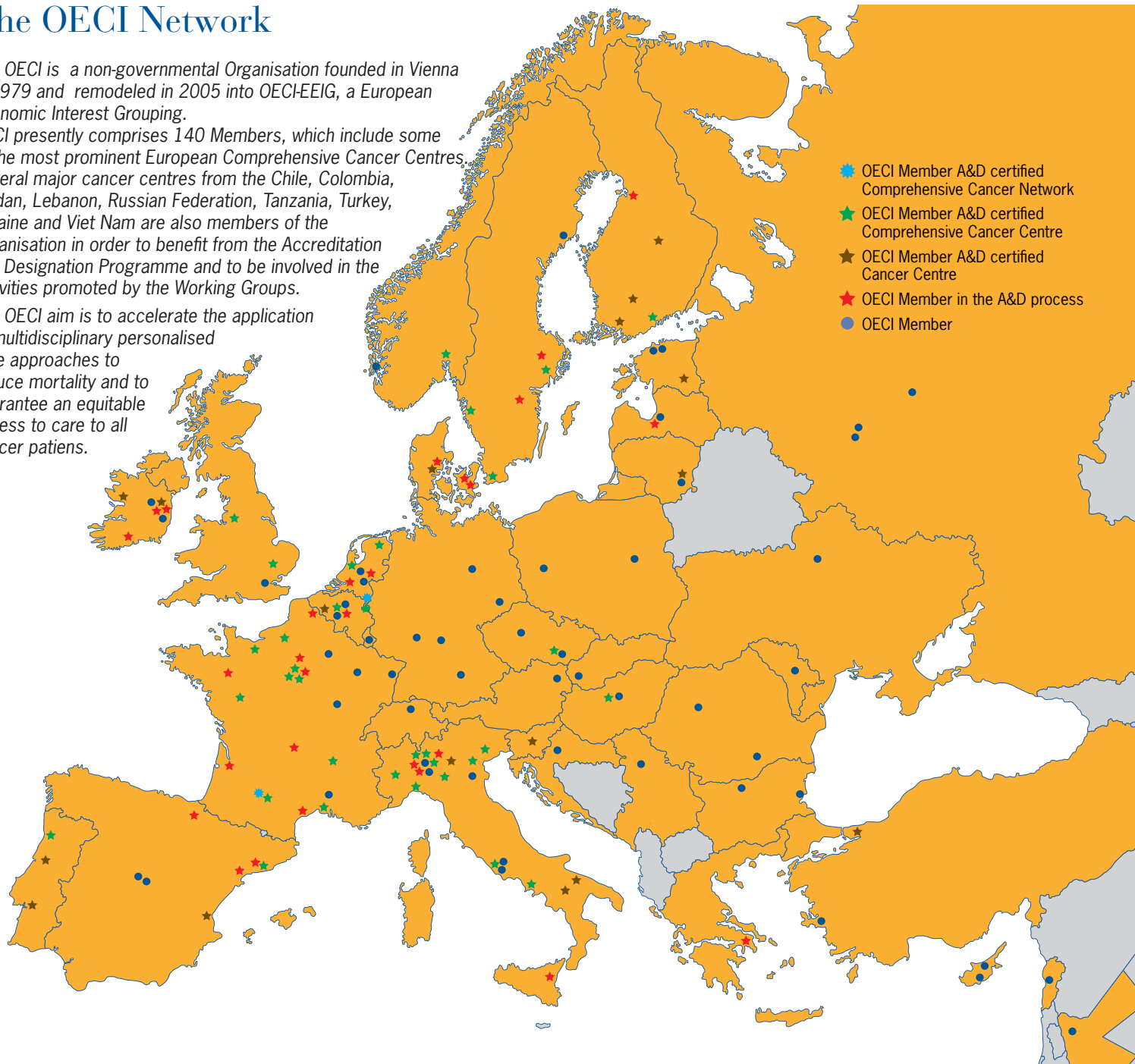

Director's foreword

HUS Comprehensive Cancer Centre (HUS CCC) combines expertise in several specialties and its clinicians are actively involved in clinical and translational research. The patient is at the core of all operations, and delivering top quality and safe treatment as well as enabling access to novel treatments in clinical trials is the centre's foremost task. The Centre is strongly committed to improving quality of care and treatment results, and the objective is to maintain its position among the leading cancer centres in Europe. This requires constant cooperation with international networks, such as OECI.

Description of the Centre and history

The first department of radiotherapy started its activities in Helsinki in 1936 and since then the unit has continuously grown to become the first Nordic and second European CCC within the OECI network in 2014. HUS CCC is responsible for the oncological treatment of cancer throughout the area of Helsinki and Uusimaa, with a population of approximately 1.7 million. It is Finland's largest Cancer Centre and one of the largest in the Nordic Countries. It has overall responsibility for the treatment of cancer patients, integrating the oncological treatment of all cancer types including haematology and breast surgery. Each year, CCC treats over 30 000 patients, of whom more than 10 000 are new patients. The Centre employs 600 health care professionals, more than 130 of whom are physicians.

Main research activities

The Centre supports clinical and translational cancer research on a wide scale from first-in-man and early phase I studies to large Phase III and IV trials, and range from surgical oncology, radiation therapy, medical oncology and haematology to palliative care and research on psychosocial aspects of cancer. The scientists of CCC coordinate and take part in national and international clinical trials. All open studies for patients are available on the Centre's web site. HUS CCC has one of the first global hospital-based neutron accelerators for BNCT (boron neutron capture therapy).

Core Facilities

Medical research and care in Helsinki take place under the umbrella of the Academic Medical Centre Helsinki (AMCH), which consists of the HUS and the University of Helsinki. The AMCH provides a comprehensive collection of core services from biobanking to genomics, metabolomics, proteomics, bioinformatics, imaging, molecular pathology and data lakes. Systems medicine approach has been built for preclinical drug research, predictive biomarker discovery and novel personalized medicine clinical trials. Besides haematological cancers the systems precision medicine approach has been expanded to include lymphomas and solid tumours using innovative organoid and cancer-on-a-chip technologies.

Education

As a university level teaching hospital, HUS CCC is responsible for the teaching of medical students, specialist training for clinical haematology, medical oncology and radiotherapy and for the training of graduate students in the fields of clinical and translational oncology and haematology. The Centre also functions as a training unit for the sub-specialty in breast surgery and palliative medicine. In addition, the Centre educates hospital physicists, nursing students, and a formal cancer nurse education program has also been developed in collaboration with the Helsinki Metropolia University of applied Sciences.

History

The centre of Helsinki was moved to its current location in the 1600s.

In 1748 Sweden began construction of the Suomenlinna Maritime Fortress off the coast of Helsinki to counter the growing threat from Russia. The massive project brought additional wealth, inhabitants and merchants to the town.

Russia conquered Finland in 1809. The status of Helsinki was raised to capital of the autonomous **Grand Duchy of Finland** three years later. A monumental Empire-style city plan was drawn up to reflect the power of Russia and the Tsar.

Finland became **independent in 1917**, and Helsinki assumed the demanding new role of capital of the young republic. City planning was characterised by Classicism and Functionalism.

Recovering from the hardships of war, Helsinki hosted the **Summer Olympics in 1952**. The games created an international reputation for Helsinki as **an efficient and friendly host city**.

Finland has hosted many international **summit meetings** in Helsinki, including the Conference for Security and Co-operation in Europe in 1975.

Finland became an **EU Member State in 1995**. Finland has held the **EU Presidency** in 1999, 2006 and 2019.

Restaurant NJK is very popular in Helsinki and experienced in events with a big number of audience. This yacht club restaurant at the core of Helsinki seaside is an excellent venue for events large and small.

The rules of Yacht Club NJK (Nylandska Jaktklubben) were codified on 4th March 1861 in the official presentation of Czar Alexander the Second. NJK moved to Valkosaari island in 1885 and the first club building was finished by the end of that same year. The beautiful white NJK villa, still standing today, was designed by architects Estlander and Zettergren and inaugurated on 31 August 1900. The traditional style of the building has been carefully preserved over the years, and inside the walls of the villa the numerous friendship flags from yachting clubs around the world, as well as the large collection of half-model boats on display, are proof of the club’s long yachting traditions.

The restaurant can seat 200–300 guests. The restaurant always strives to combine the marine culinary tradition of the Nordic countries with contemporary gastronomy – in a spectacular and historical setting. 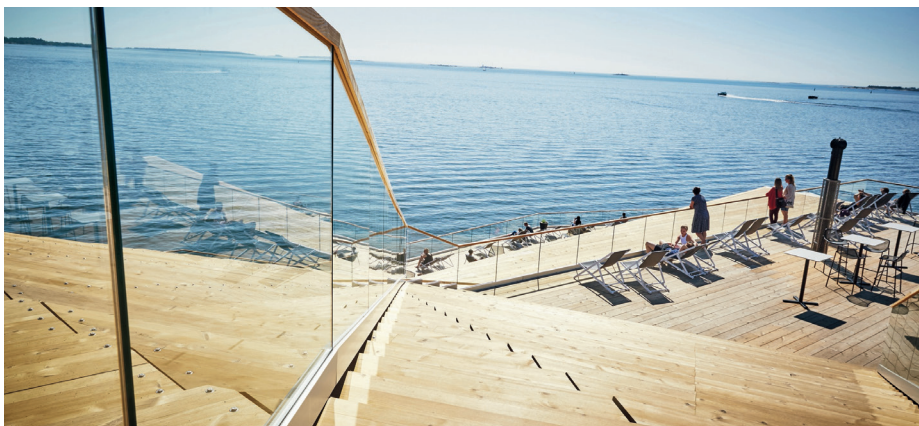

The proximity of the Arctic Ocean and the North Atlantic creates cold weather, while the Gulf Stream brings in warmer air. Summer in Helsinki is bright. Days are at their longest in the second half of June, when the sun stays above the horizon for 19 hours. In June the average temperature is 19 °C.
